



Year 7 Annual Exam for English

The English end of year exam will be divided into 2 sections:

Section A: Reading Assessment

You will be given an extract from 'Oliver Twist' by Charles Dickens. You will be asked to write an essay using PETAL or PEA paragraphs, explaining how the writer has achieved certain effects. In this section, you should answer the question by writing an introduction and several paragraphs with quotations and analysis. (30 mins)

Section B: Writing Assessment

You will be asked to write a descriptive or narrative piece of original writing based on a writing prompt. You will be marked on your writing skills including your descriptive detail, vocabulary, use of language techniques, use of a variety of sentence structures, and your spelling, punctuation, and grammar. (30 mins)
